FACTS about Homelessness in Palm Beach County

- Counts continue a steady rise
 - Current homeless population > 2,100
- ➤ Most often results from a complex set of circumstances
 - **❖** Lack of affordable housing
 - Increase in poverty
- > Homeless Advisory Board
- > Ten-Year Plan to End Homelessness
 - Approach: Prevention and Termination vs. Management
 - Continuum of Care model to self-sufficiency
 - **Centralize response system**





FALSE PERCEPTIONS about Homeless Resource Centers

- > NOT merely a shelter
- > NOT a permanent housing solution
- NOT a "soup kitchen"
- > NOT a new practice to address homelessness
- > NOT a convalescent / psychiatric / detoxification facility
- > NOT an emergency medical care facility
- > NOT tolerable to illegal activity and inappropriate behavior
- > NOT proven to increase crime or decrease property values
- DO NOT OPERATE IN ISOLATION
 - ◆ Extensive network of support and services

HOMELESS RESOURCE CENTER

Description:

A facility providing homeless clients with 24-hour daily access to supportive services including, but not limited to, a universal intake and assessment process; beds for use as an interim housing option when permanent housing is not immediately available; engagement centers; prepared meals; as well as medical, psychiatric and educational services.

Philosophies:

- ➤ A homeless individual will spend less time roaming the streets when provided with easy access and delivery of the services provided by a Homeless Resource Center and the extensive support network.
- ➤ When homeless individuals are surrounded by clean, safe and supportive environments, increases in self-esteem and feelings of self-worth lead to more rapid progress on their path to self-sufficiency.
- ➤ A Homeless Resource Center is both an alternative AND a solution to homeless loitering.

 - ❖ Intake beds (3M, 3F)
- > 24 hour daily operation
 - Walk-in services provided from dawn to dusk
 - Limited acceptance from dusk to dawn

Assessment

- Social Service Providers
- Economic Service Providers
- Mental Health and Substance Abuse Service Providers
- Medical Service Providers

Restrooms, Lounge, Laundry, Storage

PROGRAMMING

FAMILY Engagement

Intake and Assessment

- Physically separated from Adult Engagement
- Same services as Adult Engagement

24 hour daily operation

- Typical stay of less than 24 hours
- Transportation by contracted service provider to an off-site family housing facility

~3 occupants / room

Maximum of 60 occupants at any given time

- ~30 M
- ~30 F

Typical stay of <30 days

Common Lounge

HOMELESS RESOURCE CENTER

PROGRAMMING

Food Service

Client service only (no take-out meal services)

No full-service kitchen on site

- Kitchen for final food preparation
- Food delivery:
 - Local vendor, or
 - Existing PBC kitchen facility
- ➤ 3 daily deliveries

Appliances for heating/cooling meals

Limited dishwashing capabilities

Engagement / Assessment

- Implement Individualized Plan
- Employment Services
- Class Assignments
- Reevaluate Schedule

DAYS 31– 60 (if applicable)


Ongoing Engagement / Assessment

- Follow Individualized Plan and Daily Schedule
- Weekly Extension of Stay (pending permanent housing placement)

DAYS 6-30

Ongoing Engagement / Assessment

- Follow Individualized Plan and Daily Schedule
- Regular Progress Meetings
- Routine Reviews of Personal Plan
- Pursue Employment
- Housing Placement

SITE DETAILS

- > ~3.8 Acres
- Commercial Zoning and Future Land Use
- ➤ Constructed in 1983-84 for Professional and Medical Office
- > ~36,000 Building Square Feet
 - ❖ Building 1 (single story): ~9,000 Square Feet
 - Former WPB Engineering Services Dept.
 - Proposed Engagement Center (Intake), etc.
 - ❖ Building 2 (single story): ~13,000 Square Feet
 - Existing Medical and Dental Offices
 - Proposed Health Clinic, Engagement Center (Assessment), etc.
 - ❖ Building 3 (2 story): ~14,000 Square Feet
 - Former WPB Human Resources and Public Utilities Depts.
 - Proposed Interim Housing, Food Service, etc.
- Vehicular Access to 45th Street and Windsor Avenue

HOMELESS RESOURCE CENTER

Security Measures

Programmatic Controls

- Client Screening (background, possessions, etc.)
- Client Curfew
- Designated Client Areas (parking, smoking, etc.)

Private Security Contractor

- 24 hour presence on a daily basis
 - > Site Patrol
 - Access Control
 - Program Support

Perimeter Fencing (existing to remain)

- Control / Limit Access
- Psychological Boundary

Gate at Windsor Avenue (existing to remain)

Closed and locked when not in use


Intrusion Alarm and Door Monitoring Devices
